1. Introduction

This document records the findings of this self-evaluation and our current improvement plan, including targets and the actions we will implement to meet the targets.

The outcomes of our last improvement plan from 2020-2022 are in the Appendix (p.

7). The year 2022-2023 was used as a review year following the Covid pandemic.

1.1 The focus of this evaluation

We undertook self-evaluation of teaching and learning during the period *Sept. 2023* to *Feb. 2024*. We evaluated the following aspect(s) of teaching and learning:

- Challenges of moving from primary to secondary schools
- Challenges of moving from junior to senior cycle

2. Findings of this evaluation

- **2.1** This is effective / very effective practice in our school
 - Most students feel that they are able to study. (75% say they can study effectively in some subjects; 12% believe that they study effectively in all subjects.) Over half of parents take an active role in their son/daughters' study 98% of parents review their son/daughters' reports with them.

2.2. This is how we know:

- Two focus groups were established: one for junior cycle students and one for senior cycle students.
- Following consultation with the two focus groups our theme "linking learning" was established.
- Teachers were then consulted at a whole staff meeting.
- Following this all students and parents were surveyed on their views.
- This data was used by the SSE team to formulate targets and actions.

Target 1

December 2024 Result: Can only be measured at summer tests - as there was only a 2.5 week lead up to winter tests.

May 2025 Result: 35% used the structured study plan for 3 or more weeks.

December 2024 Result: In the parent/ guardian survey 94% of respondents were aware that their son/daughter received a structured study plan from school. 71% looked at the revision plans with their son/daughter.

May 2025 Result: In the parent/ guardian survey 96.5% of respondents were aware that their son/daughter received a structured study plan from school.

65% of parents/guardians looked at it with their son/daughter.

Subject teachers to check in with classes about revision timetables.	The SSE team asked their classes in May 2024 about how useful revision timetables are - they received only positive feedback. This was supported by survey results in December and May 2025.

Teacher survey May 2024. Wider discussion of results at staff meeting 31 May 2024.	Evaluate results of teacher survey May 2024: Good feedback on DEAS and revision timetables. Staff are positive about One Page Revision methodology - but they need more time and support to adopt it. 53% of survey respondents reported adopting the strategy with some of their classes. 25% have not used it yet.
Observation of student use of study plans during <i>DEAS</i> classes.	Evaluate results of teacher survey May 2024: Positive response - 35% of teacher respondents reported very good use of DEAS classes and 47% reported good use. 75% of teacher respondents believe that revision timetables are very useful for students.
Focus groups to be held in September to evaluate how last years' targets went and to feed into next years' targets.	Evaluation of data from focus groups. Most students in both focus groups did not remember looking at the study skills presentation that was shared with them via email. Students suggested that it would be better if individual subject teachers shared study tips for their subjects. Students reported an improvement in the usefulness of structured study plans - Both groups felt 4.5 weeks would be optimal at summer. Students all agreed that the DEAS classes are valuable but they also would prefer if

DEAS classes happened during non exam subjects.

• Students feel the One Page Revision methodology is a good idea. They say only a few teachers use it. Junior students would prefer if the teachers gave them the completed pages or at least

headings and structure for them. Senior students acknowledged that the learning happens in creating the pages themselves

but they would like more scaffolding and maybe a completed one to be given after they have finished their own in case they are missing important data. They also

pointed out that they lend themselves more to some topics than others.

 Less stress was reported by these focus groups regarding the CBAs. They still feel there are too many and that they overlap, but they acknowledge that they are as spread out as possible.

Survey second and fifth years following Study Skills Seminar.

Results and Analysis:

February as that was the earliest availability. 58% of the 121 respondents agreed/strongly agreed that they know more about studying than they did before the seminar. 59% agreed/strongly agreed that they intended on using study skills strategies that they learned during the seminars. 61% agreed/strongly agreed that they would recommend the seminars to students their age. Informal student feedback regarding the surveys was very positive - the only negative feedback was that students would have preferred if they were held earlier in the year.

NECESSARY ADJUSTMENTS THROUGHOUT IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS

- Study timetable shortened from a 6 week to a 3.5 week timeframe following student focus groups and surveys in May 2024.
- Second and Fifth year workshops scheduled for January 2025 good time for a "fresh approach" 24 Study Skills email will be shown at the start of the first DEAS class.
- Following the focus group in September 2024 structured study plan to be increased from 3.5 weeks to 4.5 weeks in summer, however only a 2.5 week plan can be given for the winter tests as that is the gap between the Mid Term and the beginning of the tests.
- A similar situation arose for the summer structured study plan as Easter was late and the plan could only be 3.5 weeks in duration. However, the plan was given before the Easter Holidays to facilitate students who wished to begin studying early.

Analysis: The figure rising to 15% in December 2024 but falling back to 12% in May 2025 could be reflective of the whole school being surveyed in December, but only first, second and fifth year students being surveyed in May. It may also reflect the timing of the surveys; as students would have already known a lot of their results for the December survey bolstering their confidence, however the May survey had to be conducted during the exam timeframe.

Analysis: 68% of students reported that they were using the structured study plans in December 2024. When members of the SSE team asked students why they weren't all using them, some students reported that they prefer to make their own plans. The SSE Team decided to modify the summer survey to see how many students were using their own plans instead. 83% of students used study plans according to the May 2025 survey. This is a very positive result.

Analysis: This target was set following the first focus group in which students expressed a wish that the structured study plans would be better if they were longer. However, during the second focus group students complained that the previous study plan of 6 weeks was too long.

The way the school calendar fell for the November 2024 tests and the May 2025 tests impacted the lead time until the exams. There was only 2.5 weeks between the Halloween Mid Term Break and the winter tests. Similarly there was only 3.5 weeks between the Easter break and the summer tests. This means this target could not be measured for the winter tests and that to achieve the target at summer three-quarters of students would have had to start using the plan immediately. In retrospect due to calendar fluctuations this target was flawed.

Analysis: This result is very positive and reflects the work of teachers in scheduling CBAs and in avoiding giving homework during CBA time.

Analysis: The initial survey of parents that informed the targets shone a light on the need to communicate the use of the structured study plans to parents. The emails and text messages communicating this appear to have helped as 96% parents/guardians reported their knowledge of the study plan in May 2025. The fact that 71% of parents/ guardians reported looking at the study plan with parents in December 2024 but only 65% report the same in May 2025 is probably reflective of the fact that third and sixth year students were not asked about in summer as the structured study plans are for in-house exams only.

Building on the previous strands one common area of continued need is to "Increase the number of students who agree that they can effectively revise material covered in class". According to this data, other areas that continue to need improvement are

- increasing the number of students who feel attendance is well monitored in the school.
- increasing the number of students who volunteer to speak aloud in class. increasing the number of students who enjoy oral presentations.
- increasing the number of students who use their journal well
- increasing the number of students who feel comfortable speaking to a member of staff if they have a problem.

It is important to note that the above results need to be understood in the context of the Covid pandemic.
